#### Raise the Powers of Love

The Winter 2016 Occasional Papers article by Liz Sweeney SSJ, entitled, "The Evolutionary Task Now: To Raise the Power of Love Upward" tracks society's evolutionary shifts of consciousness and cites Teilhard de Chardin's challenging reflection," Our role is no longer to merely ease suffering, bind up wounds, and feed the hungry, but through every form of effort to raise the powers of love upward to the next stage of consciousness."

We stand with millions across the world at an evolutionary threshold! Our Presentation 2013 *Directional Statement* echoes our communal desire to engage our hearts and voices in modeling the love necessary to transform the world.

As society's consciousness steps through the threshold, Sweeney dares us to personally move from an ego-centered posture to an eco-centered one, letting go of long-held perceptions, judgements and intolerance. She invites us to examine how we might embrace a wider, move inclusive understanding of the interconnectedness of all of life, widening our vision even further, to a global economy and shared leadership, that cares for the common good of all, especially those in need. As Sweeney sees it, our stewardship is being called forth by God in four invitations.

The Invitation to live the mystery of Christ more consciously. What does it mean to be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ in the world today? How is Christ enfleshed in our acts of mercy, compassion, healing and reconciling love? How might we intentionally make it so?

The invitation to become more intentional about engaging in individual and communal contemplation. How do we engage "communion consciousness," allowing our contemplative prayer to open us to "creative love that flows freely to all without exception, knows no boundaries, and has no enemies"? (4) In such ONENESS, we ourselves are transformed, says scripture scholar Beatrice Bruteau, into "vessels of healing presence, of engaged justice and compassion, able to love without reserve." Our communal engagement in contemplative prayer radiates out much farther than any one individual's practice may.

The invitation to create ways of coming together that deepen the bonds of relationship among us and expand the inclusivity of our love. Partnering with others is key! Unifying energy shared in circles where intentional, open, knowledge-sharing, and love gives birth to the next level of consciousness -- we don't go there alone! We ONLY move to a deeper consciousness in communion

*with others*. Integral consciousness expert, Ken Wilber "suggests that historically when 10 percent of the population functions at this high stage, a ripple effect occurs that begins to shift the whole" (5).

The invitation to be diligent about personal and collective shadow work. What aspects of our selves and our community have we yet to integrate? Parts we have rejected, denied, projected on to others, disowned because they scare us or seem dangerous? Often we can glimpse this "shadow" side individually and collectively, manifest in our anger, apathy and hostility.

As we become more integrated in a higher consciousness of oneness, we unify the partials of our lives, in our community and in our world, to make an option for the whole.

We invite you to read this article in its entirety, reflect and share in conversation around the questions and insights with which it gifts us.

This month we reiterate the Emerging Circles Process for Spring 2016.

As a Leadership Team, we excitedly solicit your experience in order to articulate a shared sense of what we are learning from the Emerging Circle Process and how to move forward. Eager to hear your experiences, insights and challenges working in the Circles, we asked you as a learning community – sisters, associates, staff - to take an online survey through SurveyMonkey.

Our hope is that the Emerging Circle Process offers opportunity to deepen member and communal emergence and engagement – expanding our knowledge and tapping the wisdom and gifts of the entire community. If you belong(ed) to more than one Circle, we asked you to complete this survey ONE time for each circle in which you participated.

This online, 18-question survey is divided into 6 short sections with a few questions in each section regarding: circle membership, connecting with the congregation, group dynamics, *Directional Statement*, the impact of communal discernment to sustain PBVM Identity, and new learnings.

When taking the survey, you may have noted that the Initial Formation Circle is not listed. As the experience of these last months unfolded, we listened and recognized that the design and oversight of Initial Formation processes does not fit easily into the Circle structure and would be better served as an area of responsibility held primarily by the Formation Coordinator and the Leadership Team. Ongoing consultation and collaboration, as appropriate, will continue to occur with a variety of people within and beyond the community.

Thank you for your time, thoughtful consideration and energy in completing the survey by Ash Wednesday, February 10. We are collating responses and will send the compilation of learnings to sisters, associates and staff, with further reflection questions for your consideration in Circle gatherings. The identity of each circle will not be conveyed. We invite you to schedule two gatherings of your Emerging Circle:

Gathering 1: between February 29 and April 10

Gathering 2: between April 25 and May 20.

#### Reverencing Relationships & Engaging Contemplation in Japan..

Every two years, Associate Sister Virgie Luchsinger attends late October four-day Ikebana classes at the School of Ikebana in Kyoto, Japan. Virgie is an Ikebana teacher (Japanese Flower Arrangement). Sister Raeleen Sweeney, who shares community with Virgie, companioned her this year and relished in a contemplative retreat while Virgie attended her classes each day. Residing in a small neighborhood hotel on third floor, the small hermit-like room, looking out to the mountains each day, added to quieting of the mind, soul and spirit.

Sunday's Japanese liturgy at the Kyoto Cathedral was a highlight. A rainy day, however, walking up the 20 steps to the massive Cathedral built in the shape of a temple, provided us with a warm welcome as we entered. English booklets were provided with many bows of kindness. Imagine if you will, the Cathedral completely filled with the Japanese congregation, each sitting 6-8 inches apart, and many women wearing lovely mantillas. The liturgy was accompanied by a choir that could match any symphonic choir in the world. At the sign of peace, each turned to one another, with hands folded, bowing quietly and reverently. We left feeling the peace, reverence and meaningfulness of

prayer in another culture.

Another highlight was the Gen-Ko a temple, originally a small Soto Zen monastery established in 1346. The Square and Round windows gave special instruction.

A bonus was to later visit five of the 1.680 Gardens in and around Kyoto with our English-speaking 60year-old, Kato, who added to the richness of our tour. He also introduced us to the traditional Kyoto "soup" made with Soba noodles and smoked mackerel

provided by two elderly ladies in their tiny shop; a delicious treat and a cherished experience. The awesomeness of experiencing the respect of nature is deep in the Japanese culture: to see an aged tree with a long drooping branch being braced respectfully with a bamboo "crutch"; to see an aged tree wrapped in a huge "bandage" for protection; to see an outside railing made of tiny wrapped twigs; to see the hundreds of careful, functional and respectful uses of bamboo,

and the respect of the old among the new in

architecture.

Not to be forgotten is the quaint village of Uji, ribboned with two active rivers running through the village. It is one of the oldest tea areas in the world where almost everything is made of green tea: pastries. pastas, ice cream... (all quite delicious!). Observing fresh tea ground in an antique grinder, we were told that tea is not appreciated by many in America because we boil the water and burn the tea. Good information.

We have taken away the guiet, mindfulness and peacefulness of life by immersing ourselves in the Japanese Culture, which provided two weeks of engaging contemplation and reverencing relationships.

# From the Office of ... VOCATIONS

Recently I participated in a Busy Student Retreat at the University of Northern Iowa Catholic Student Center. The experience was uplifting and there were many grace-filled moments. One thing that stands out in my mind is the booklet we used with the students. NRVC (the National Religious Vocation Conference) compiled a Busy Person retreat booklet with many topics and options to be used with a variety of students. This is the first time I have had the opportunity to use the booklet and I found it very helpful as it gave multiple insights into where young people place their values, hopes and concerns.

As I read the topics that could be used for our sessions, I realized the topics would be great discussion points for all of us. So I am including the items from the table of contents. They are:

- 1. All About Mary
- 2. Caring for God's Creation
- 3. Eradicating Global Poverty
- 4. Following the Voice of the Spirit
- 5. Growing through Failure
- 6. Inviting God into Decision Making
- 7. Praying in Times of Stress
- 8. Praying with Music

- 9. Promoting Global Peacemaking
- 10. Relationships: Family, Friends, and God
- 11. Time Management: 24/7
- 12. Transitions: Coping with Change, Doubts & Fears
- 13. Unplugged: Seeking Solitude
- 14. Vocation Discernment
- 15. Women in Scripture

The retreat members and spiritual guides met for about an hour each weekday Monday thru Thursday. The students picked the topics they wanted to visit about each day. We spent time with the scripture passages included as well as the questions used as follow up. These students want to be able to handle the challenges they face right now in college, but also the problems they face as they graduate and move into the world of work. The students listened intently, they asked great questions and they prayed with a sincere desire to include God in their lives.

When I doubt that the future generation will be able to handle the world we leave to them, I hope to remember this list of topics the younger generation has helped compile and thank God for the opportunity to pray with these topics during times such as a Busy Person Retreat and beyond.

# Our Journey in Formation

Recently I listened to one of the webinars offered by the Religious Formation Conference, *Hearing God's Prophetic Call: A Model for Initial and Lifelong Formation* by Brad A. Milunski, OFM Conv., a friar of the Our Lady of the Angels Province of the Franciscan Friars Conventual.



Nearly 400 others participated in this webinar free to member congregations. Milunski invited us to reflect on the call narratives of the three major prophets of the Hebrew Scriptures, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel, along with Mary of the Christian Scriptures to help us to enrich and deepen our reflection on God's call in our lives and in the lives of those in initial formation.

Reflecting on one of his favorite books and authors, Milunski encouraged us to allow our reflection on the scriptures to produce a "break" in us, an opening for God into our lives and to enlighten our experiences.

Milunski shared the pattern of the call narratives common to Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and Mary, as well as our own stories of God's call. The common elements of each call story included:

- ❖ Divine Confrontation A sense of encounter with God
- ❖ Introductory Word Invitation by God to a specific purpose
- ❖ Commission The specific purpose
- ❖ Objection The objection to God's call
- ❖ Reassurance A divine word in answer to the objection
- ❖ The Sign God's presence and assurance that the call is authentic

After sharing the call stories of the four biblical figures, he offered questions to help us reflect upon our own call stories and experiences of God's invitation. Here are a few of the reflection questions offered following the reflections on each call story.

- ❖ Isaiah How does an awareness of your own sinfulness and brokenness empower or hinder your ministry as formator?
- ❖ Jeremiah How does your own experience and awareness of God enable you to sense the experience of God in those whom you serve?
- ❖ Ezekiel Of what does my ongoing formation diet consist?
- ❖ Mary Am I willing to put my whole self at the service of God's plan?

On Friday, January 29 and February 5, two different groups of elementary teachers from Chile and some members of the Kiwanis Club of Galena came to the center to see the materials we use and learn more about classroom activities that they could use with their students. They seemed pleased with what they observed and were especially interested in one of our resources, a small book that gives the Spanish word, the word in English and then the phonetic pronunciation of the English word in Spanish. For example, Socorro, (help) and then (jelp) because the  $\bf j$  in Spanish sounds like an  $\bf h$  to our ears.

All students in Chile start to learn English in 5th grade. Some of the teachers work in very rural areas with few resources.

Kevin Mink hopes to go to Japan or Nepal to teach English with the Peace Corps. He is busy writing down every good idea that he learns from our tutors plus doing many things for me.

#### **University of Dubuque Education Class visits the center**

Professor Julie Philips brought her class to the center. When I asked the students if they knew what we do at the center, one student responded that her grandmother was a tutor here and that she knew all about the center.

#### **Guest speaker to the Wendt Character Scholars**

# UÉ TAL, BOLIVIA? [What's Happening, Bolivia?]

#### A visit with Justina Cuellar

Justina lives in the community of Yukimbia, along the Pilcomayo River in the northern corner of San Luis Parish, with her children, grandchildren and her mother, Evarista. She has been widowed five years now. Her husband, Roberto, died suddenly of cancer, and since then, she has been on her own raising her children.



She is a hard working woman and takes pride in what she does, whether weaving a basket or planting corn. She proudly shows off a small garden with beans as well as a recently planted tree that she hopes will someday provide shade to her house. Her home, a very simple rustic structure made of mud and sticks with a thatched roof, is temporarily covered with a blue tarp until it can be repaired. According to the tradition of the Guarani people, her husband is buried in their home.

Two months ago, her oldest son, Ivan, 19, died. It was late at night, he was carrying a heavy load and fell off the cliff. Recently when we visited her we learned that they had just buried her one year old grandson, who had been sick with an intestinal virus for only a week.

Marlu offered important advice to the students and their parents about the necessity to complete a FASA application for each college possibility. She also counseled the participants to seek

scholarships offered to Latino students from private universities, which sometimes surpass the subsidies offered at public universities. The Hispanic partakers were particularly appreciative of Marlu's sensitivity to their questions and her sharing of her personal experience of working diligently with her parents to finish college.

After carefully measuring the dimensions of the person, she utilized a special curved ruler to fashion her patterns on large sheets of white paper before cutting the cloth. The women were carefully observing the steps. Sughey then demonstrated how to thread the bobbin and the sewing machine and began to sew the new garments. Their conversation after the class indicated their respect for the art and their sense that this is an art that will serve their families well.



Sisters Carmen and Maura witnessed the joyful marriage of the new *Luz Hispana* board member, Anabel Ramirez, to Juan Alanis on January 15. The young couple are parents to two children previously born to Anabel: Marcos, who is ten years old, and Maria, who is eight, and one child born to the two of them, Alyzarith, who is eight months old. After the joyful ceremony, the young couple hosted a reception in a small hall in Hampton attended by close family members and friends. The elation of this celebration was tangible to all present, but particularly in the faces of Anabel, Juan, and their children.

Sisters Carmen and Maura attended the Iowa Caucus in Hampton on February 1. This was Maura's first Iowa Caucus because she had not been an election year resident in Iowa for over 50 years. A massive Central Iowa blizzard arrived after the caucus that night causing classes to be dismissed for the following two days, but a decent crowd showed up for the pre-election event. The Hampton results mirrored rather closely the Iowa percentages giving preference to Hilary Clinton and Ted Cruz.

# Hotel Hope Update February 2016

Rapid Re-housing for Families

#### A quick approach to house families who are homeless

UNITY of Greater New Orleans is a nonprofit organization leading a collaborative of over 60 agencies providing housing and services to people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. Their strategic plan is to reach a functional zero in family homelessness by Thanksgiving 2016, end long-term homelessness of people with disabilities by July 4, 2017, reach a functional zero in youth homelessness by 2019, and reduce street homelessness by 75 percent by 2020.

Though most all nonprofit organizations receiving federal money for men, women and youth in housing crises are a part of this plan, Hotel **Hope** and the New Orleans Women and Children's Shelter have been asked by UNITY to pilot a program that will help to mainstream the referral process and give a more accurate account of the number of families in need of housing with a quicker placement in a more stable and permanent home. Crisis calls received by Hotel Hope will be directed to the UNITY outreach team who will then verify their homelessness and assess their case.



If they qualify for the Family Rapid Rehousing Program, they may be placed in emergency housing (60 days) or moved into tthransitional housing prior to their permanent residence. Hotel **Hope** is working with the New Orleans Women and Children Center to collaborate, with extending services to families until our facility is ready to accept visitors. UNITY hopes that this pilot project of working toward a coordinated entry system will assist homeless families more easily. Hotel Hope will work toward maintaining the resources to support this model for the long term once the building renovation is complete.

## Searching the Streets to Fight Homelessness

On January 25 and 26, 2016, teams of advocates for homeless people searched Jefferson and Orleans parishes' streets, abandoned buildings and shelters to determine how many people are going without a home on any given night. Sisters Julie and Mary Lou assisted the "point in time" count volunteering at the New Orleans Mission.

The annual "point in time" count has shown significant improvements since Hurricane Katrina propelled a rising number of people into the streets. In 2005 there were 2,051 homeless people in the two parishes. That number jumped to 11,619 in 2007 then gradually fell year by year to 1,703 in 2015.

The number of chronically homeless people – defined as a person with a disabling condition who has been homeless for more than a year or has had four episodes of being homeless in the past three years – has also seen drastic decreases. It fell from a high of 4,579 in 2009 to 423 in 2015.

One of New Orleans' most celebrated successes in its fight against homelessness is City Hall's creation of a system that allows for the rapid rehousing of homeless military veterans.

In 2014, President Barack Obama challenged mayors and governors across the United States to house every homeless veteran by the end of 2015.

The new priority for New Orleans is to end Family Homelessness. Using the system created for the veterans will allow providers to collaborate to work together to end family homelessness.
