As we approach Community Days, questions for our prayerful reflection:

How would you describe your/our current reality? What is your personal contribution/commitment to *our collective*, unfolding future?

What is emerging?

With what new insights has personal prayer and contemplation gifted you?

How and to what are you listening these days?

What could empower you/us to feel fully engaged and energized?

What's possible and what do we need to learn in order to make it happen?

In these sacred weeks prior to gathering, let's pray for and with one another, for Sisters Kathy McCluskey, CSJ and Pat Kozak, CSJ – our facilitators, and for all with whom we are fortunate enough to serve.

From the Office of ... VOCATIONS

The National Religious Vocation Conference is a professional organization of vocation ministers that presents religious life as a viable option in the Catholic Church. NRVC promotes vocation awareness, invitation, and discernment to life as a religious sister, brother or priest. NRVC reflects all forms of religious life and provides education opportunities, resources and other support services for spiritual, professional, and personal growth. NRVC proclaims a positive and hopeful image of religious life in the Church and society, while affirming the call to holiness of each person. NRVC fosters dialogue on vocational issues with a variety of Church organizations, with special emphasis on those who serve young adults and parents.

No other country in the world has an organization like NRVC. People from other counties look to the United States for leadership in the area of vocation ministry. In response to the needs expressed by those working in vocation ministry, NRVC has expanded programs and created ways to help religious communities in today's world. In its mission statement NRVC expresses its commitment to provide resources for growth and development, the need for collaboration, its willingness to speak as an official voice for vocation ministers and to act as a corporate influence on the Church and in society. Membership in NRVC offers several benefits including the ability to apply for scholarship grants, access to award winning publications and resources, access to a professional support network, connection to other national and international professional organizations and the opportunity to attend national conferences where nationally and internationally recognized speakers present.

NRVC membership is divided into 12 member areas. Vocation ministers may attend gatherings and programs in any of the 12 member areas. The meetings and gatherings are posted on the NRVC website. The Dubuque Area Vocation Association just hosted the Heartland Area gathering in April. Members from Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Kansas attended this gathering and heard important information from Sister Debbie Borneman, Director of Member Relations and Services for NRVC. One of the hidden benefits for being a member of NRVC is the opportunity to share what works and what doesn't work. There is great wisdom in the room as vocation ministers gather to learn and share. During our time together in April we did committee work for our national convocation to be held in October. Our Heartland Area is in charge of planning much of the convocation that will bring us together to share our wisdom, hear many great presenters and spend time in prayer. As part of the convocation there is a closing banquet where awards are presented and acknowledgements for service are made. The Dubuque Area Vocation Association will receive the Mustard Seed Award for helping to create a culture of vocation in the Dubuque area.

Our Journey in Formation

"Drawn together
by the sustaining vision of a Daughter of Ireland
and by matters of the heart,
we gather..."



These poetic words of our own Corine Murray (*Lantern Bearers*) speak well of what we experienced at the International Formation Gathering held in Lusaka, Zambia May 17-29, 2016. We used Corine's poem along with a poem by Lois Greene, PBVM of Newfoundland as part of our morning prayer on May 19. Each day sisters from different PBVM units took turns planning and leading morning prayer. This time of prayer each day reflected beautifully the culture and vibrant spirit of the group.

"Reimagining Initial Formation across the Congregation as a Co-creative Process for Mission" was the tenth International Formation Gathering since the Union of Presentation Sisters was formed almost forty years ago. New to this conference was the presence of four sisters in temporary vows, eleven sisters up to ten years since perpetual profession, and unit leadership team links to formation. There were twelve of us present who minister directly in initial formation.

The objectives for the gathering were:

- To re-imagine and plan for formation in an evolving religious life
- To deepen the spirituality of being in communion
- To look at formation... as spiritual, relational, and organizational
- To share the lived reality of formation in the different units
- To hear the voices of those in initial formation
- To ensure that participants gain a deeper understanding for intercultural living
- To reimage how formators walk with those in formation

The conference was artfully facilitated by Clare Stanley, SJC (from Sierra Leone). Gail Worelo (co-founder of Green Mountain Monastery), Mick McGuire, SSC (psychologist and trainer of formators in Manilla), and Pat Murray, IBVM (Executive Secretary of UISG in Rome) offered a healthy balance of input and time to process in large and small group settings.

Gail invited us to reflect on how Nano Nagle is still unfolding in an evolutionary context. She challenged us to consider religious life from the



perspectives of emergence and belonging. Mick encouraged health and balance in the areas of personal development, community, spiritual life, ministry, exercise, and sleep/rest. Pat spoke of current trends in religious life and asked us to consider what kind of formation is needed at this time.

I deeply appreciate this opportunity to gather with other Presentation Sisters that work in initial and on-going formation ministry. I learned a great deal and found the time renewing and energizing. I look forward to continuing to share the fruits of this gathering with you all.

Current membership has been altered by the circumstances of life: increased family obligations, moving to another location, retirement plans, additional involvements and deaths. Long-time members Ron and Mary Dankert, Joe and Louise Ottavi, Barb Ressler, Jan Gertsama, and Sister Joan Lickteig meet monthly to pray and share.

Meetings include discussions and shared insights of the Sunday scriptures, books, and papal documents; a collection for Dubuque's Catholic Worker House provides a monthly offering of funds and needed supplies.

In addition to the sometimes extensive involvement in their parishes, associate members participate in Presentation outreach activities, especially Art, Craft, and Bake Sale, Garage Sale, contributions to Christmas gifts for the homeless, Relay for Life, and other charitable activities sponsored at Mount Loretto. Sarah had the opportunity to meet and get to know many sisters personally during her stay at the motherhouse during the first three weeks she was on the job. She enjoyed her stay immensely and has now moved into her new apartment. At the Lantern Center, Sister Corine has been working very diligently to pass on institutional knowledge to Sarah to make the transition to directorship as successful as possible.

Driver's License Obtained

A young Mexican student, Kevin, passed his driver's license exam in May. He is now on the road and appreciating this new found freedom. Before obtaining his license, Kevin reports that he walked to a lot of places which was "tiring" and especially difficult in the winter months, and, he often depended on friends to get to work. Now, he says life is easier, and above all, he "has more time." Having a car helps him get back and forth to work, home, the Center and "Walmart" with greater ease. It is good to be mobile in America!

Young Mother at the Library

Another young student and recent-arrival, Brenda from Venezuela, has the great responsibility of taking care of her two-year-old son while her husband works two jobs to make ends meet. Brenda has no transportation and walks to the center with her son two-three times each week to meet with her tutors. Her son entertains himself in our toy area while she studies and keeps an eye on him simultaneously. Brenda wanted more opportunities for her son to interact with other children his age, primarily to improve his speaking skills. This need became known at the center. Sarah and Corine both agreed that summer programs at the library might be a good fit. Brenda, being very self-motivated, did not wait for us to call the library for her, but walked to the Carnegie-Stout library with her son. She did not have proof of address, so the library sent a postcard to her home address. A few days later, with the postcard in hand, she returned to the library to get her library card. She was very thankful for the registration librarian named Kevin who was patient while she spoke slowly to get the information she needed. She learned about some summer programs for her son and has plans to return to the library soon for a special children's event with a juggling clown, and then at later times for a recurring toddler story time.

Way to go, Brenda! And all this happened in sneakers, with a stroller and a two-year-old. She will need to return to the library again in 90 days since the initial library card expires within that time frame. She explains that her next card will be good for six months and then a third renewal of the card will allow her to keep the card for one year or more.

Annual Trip to the River Museum

On Friday and Saturday, June 17-18, students and tutors (and family members) will make our annual trip to the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium. We are thankful to the Everybody's Museum program and the River Museum for providing entry at no cost.

In the beginning of June, the Lantern Center received a positive response to our grant request to the Sisters of the Presentation Ministry Donation Committee. This is \$5,000 that we will use for learning materials, maintenance and other practical purchases that affect our bottom line. Thank you!


¿Qué tal, Bolivia? [What's Happening, Bolivia?]

Thirty-seven booths lined the streets with ticket sales, tenderloins, tacos, wine tasting, beauty products, Tupperware, Mexican handicrafts, and a great variety of souvenirs and products. The giant inflatables beckoned the children, the Spanish Dancing Horse paused ready to show off her unusual talents, and the Folkloric Dancers of *La Luz Hispana* as well as the Aztec Dancers began to appear in their flamboyant regalia.

The Petting Zoo, the trolley towed by 2 mules, and a remarkable puppet show performed by Sister Rita Menart were gratuitous. All of the stage performances were also complimentary, including the Spanish Dancing Horse, the folkloric dances, the Rising Sun Karate group, the prominent Mexican singer, Cristal Fuentes, with her band *Passion Tropical*, the DJ music and two other renowned bands: *La Voz del Sur*, and *Banda Oro*. Our own PBVM associate, Darla Budden, a stunning and fruitful clown, drew the public's attention to the attractions going on throughout the day.

A sudden torrent of rain in the afternoon, coupled with a hefty wind sent spectators and booth administrate

with a hefty wind sent spectators and booth administrators scampering to shelter. Then without ado, the sun came out robustly ten minutes later, and parents with children poured to the ticket booth so that they could share in the fun. In the evening the raffle drawing took

place. Steve Pearson, a parishioner of St. Patrick's, captured the grand prize of \$2,000. Associate Joann Gullickson, and her husband, Lee holed up in the office to count the proceeds, netting around \$20,000.

At 9 pm, the bank ceased its music, Sisters Carmen Hernandez, Maura McCarthy, and Brook Boehmler expressed thanks to the sponsors, participants, and volunteers. The following note of gratitude appears in the *Hampton Chronicle*:

Yer Vang, an immigration attorney who recently began working for Catholic Charities in the Archdiocese of Dubuque, and Tracy Morrison, Executive Director of the institution, came to *La Luz Hispana* on May 10 to meet Sisters Carmen and Maura and explore the legal needs of the Hispanic people of Hampton. The two professionals expressed interest in supporting the Hispanic population of Franklin County and surrounding areas, beginning with the students eligible for DACA, (Deferred Action For Children Arrivals). Yer Vang offered to do a session in August on KNOW YOUR RIGHTS, and the importance of preparing legal documents with power of attorney for finance, health care, legal guardians, and titles in emergencies.

Brook Boehmler, Mayor of Hampton and manager of Pappajohn Center Entrepreneur NIACC, came to this meeting to meet the visitors and to manifest his interest in new business opportunities for immigrants in Franklin County, their legal status notwithstanding. Boehmler expressed his interest in proposing identity cards for all residents of Franklin County, which would permit local voting privileges and civic participation.

Megan Rosenberg, of the Cady and Rosenberg Law Firm, also attended to offer her solidarity with the Hispanics of the Hampton area. Megan had made a presentation last year on the basic stages of DACA and DAPA.

All participants spoke of the importance of promoting driver's licenses in the state of Iowa and the need for advocacy for immigrants on the federal level. All agreed that the new families offer myriad benefits to North Central Iowa.

Amy Kangas, Spanish instructor at Hampton Dumont High School, and Tricia Christiansen, counselor, brought a group of 12 fourth year Spanish students to *La Luz Hispana* on May 25, so that the Hispanic women could explain in Spanish the process of making enchiladas and rice. The women continued the conversation with the students as all enjoyed the delicious results. The women encouraged the students to dialog in Spanish with their Hispanic companions in order to advance their language proficiency.

'Mary' Visits 'Elizabeth'



Perhaps you have heard a preacher ask a congregation while telling the story of the

Annunciation, "Put yourself in Mary's shoes; experience her feelings of confusion, fear and loneliness." Mary learned she was pregnant, on the verge of homelessness, ostracized by friends and family. No wonder that when she her heard the news that Elizabeth was expecting she couldn't wait go to her cousin to give and receive comfort and support.

Recently we received a call from a young woman who had a newborn baby two weeks before and who was in need of rental assistance. She worked with people with developmental and behavioral disabilities. Having given birth, she was unable to work and had to hold paying many bills. Still in pain from delivery, she was crying and fearful of eviction. This "Mary" was alone with no family or friends able to help. She was about to become another statistic — a homeless woman with a child. Due to her late payment, this young woman's rent had increased to \$700.

I quickly called upon the "partners" of Hotel Hope to come to her aid. "Mary" had never been on any federal or state assistance before, so she also found herself without food. Within hours I was able to deliver a check to her so that she could stay in her apartment and buy baby formula and groceries. She was beside herself with gratitude. I assured her that she was not alone — in fact. there was another young woman living in the same apartment complex two doors down who was in the same situation five months before. She seemed somewhat relieved that there was hope for her. A little while later, I returned to "Mary's" house with "Elizabeth" and child. Both women embraced and cried tears of joy knowing that neither of them was alone.

I am most grateful to experience God's abundant grace as I minister to those who are poor and homeless. Whenever I can't sleep at night, wondering if I did all I could to help those in need that day, I think of "Mary and Elizabeth" to remind me that God is in charge.

We often speak of the immigration issue and the problems it causes with Hispanic families. Recently I had the privilege of sitting down with the wives of two men who were detained and are currently in a Cedar Rapids jail awaiting trial. I felt blessed because I was able to speak to them and listen to their stories in their own language, and also because they trusted me. I would like to share part

of their stories with you so you can pray for them and their situations in particular.

One of the young women is 24-years-old, and has a 15-month-old son. They live in a duplex in Dyersville surrounded by cousins of her husband, but she really has no one around. She works in a factory and pays for child care for her son. Her husband has been in jail for a month, and soon should have a trial to determine his fate. He was deported in 2008, returned to the states in 2013 because he was beaten so badly in Mexico, and advised by human services that he needed to escape. His wounds were so serious that he went to the hospital here in the states and they found cancer. Fortunately, they were able to remove the cancerous growth without any further treatment, and he had been working and living peacefully with his family until immigration entered his home with a warrant and took him away.

His brother has been in the U.S. for 16 years, and lived with his wife and his two daughters, ages 12 and three in Cascade. Last week he was dropped off from work in his back yard, and immigration was right behind the car, picked him up for working with illegal documents, and took him away. His wife was just coming in the front door, and as he tried to call her, the phone went dead.

I am not going to make any further comments and will let you draw your own conclusions. I spent time praying with the two women, and am in contact with a lawyer from Catholic Charities to see about the cases of the two brothers. I strongly believe that the Lord brought me back here at this time for a purpose. I have spent time sharing with the priests regarding immigration issues, giving pertinent information to the Hispanics in the area who need to know their rights, and "offering hope and love to a broken world" as our mission statement suggests.

The story is far from over, but like Nano, I intend to continue to take down the lantern from its niche and go forth to the people living in the shadows. I know that all of you will continue to pray for immigration reform, and hopefully, having stories of some real people affected by the immigration laws will enable me to bring it to the consciousness of others who may not understand the immigration system or the ways that women and children are affected by it. In many ways, my hands are tied, as I can do nothing for the men in jail, whom I do not know. But I can support their wives and children as they wait, often with little hope, for a positive outcome to situations that are out of their control.
